



Uber facing federal probe on allegations of espionage - Uber us spies

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Federal prosecutors are investigallegations that Uber deployed an espionage team to plun

secrets from its rivals. The revelation triggered a delay in a high-profile trial over whether beleaguered ride-hailing service stole self-driving car technology from a Google spinoff.

The probe under way at the U.S. Justice Department centers on a 37-page letter that describle allegations made by Richard Jacobs, Uber's former manager of global intelligence. Jacobs letter sent in May to an Uber lawyer. The letter contended that Jacobs had been wrongfully and then fired for trying to stop the company's alleged misconduct.

The investigation hadn't been publicly known until Tuesday, when it surfaced in a court he was supposed to set the stage for a trial pitting Uber against Waymo, a self-driving car pior started within Google eight years ago.

The hearing instead quickly turned into a forum raising more questions about Uber's ethic corporate culture. Over the past year, Uber has been rocked by revelations of <u>rampant sext</u> <u>harassment</u> inside the company, technological trickery <u>designed to thwart regulators</u> and a <u>cover-up</u> of a hacking attack that stole the personal information of 57 million passengers are drivers.

Jacobs, whose lawyer wrote the letter at the center of the courtroom drama, testified Tuesc Uber had set up a unit called Marketplace Analytics to steal trade secrets from its rivals ow didn't specify which competitors Uber had targeted. His allegations had been kept under withe Justice Department passed them along to U.S. District Judge William Alsup last week.

In an unusual move, Alsup had recommended in May that the Justice Department open a investigation into Uber, based on the evidence he had heard in the Waymo case.

To protect itself against potential trouble, Uber frequently communicated on a service called that automatically erases messages, according to Jacobs. The company also relied on a surcomputer system to eliminate all digital trails, and dispatched its security team to train selecar engineers in Pittsburgh how to conceal their electronic tracks, Jacobs testified.

Uber's espionage team also hired contractors who employed former CIA agents to help wit surveillance, according to Jacobs.

Pressed under questioning, Jacobs acknowledged that the letter also alleged that Uber had trade secrets from Waymo, as well as other intellectual property in the U.S.

"It is possible that he has been bought off by Uber," Alsup said of Jacobs at one point durir Tuesday's drama.

Alsup described the allegations in the letter as "scandalous" and lashed out at Uber's legal not informing him about them before he was notified by the Justice Department. "I can't to anything you say because it has been proven wrong so many times," Alsup told Uber attorn Gonzalez. The judge also called Uber's espionage team "a plumber's unit doing bad deeds."

Gonzalez repeatedly tried to persuade Alsup that the allegations in Jacobs' letter had nothi with Waymo's case against Uber. The lawyer also argued that the company used secretive communications channels for employee safety reasons. But the judge wasn't swayed.

"There is a 50-50 chance that this is going to turn out very bad for Uber," Alsup said. "And 50-50 chance that this will turn out to be a dry hole."

In a statement defending itself, Uber pointed to Jacobs' testimony that he wasn't aware of company stealing any of Waymo's trade secrets. "None of the testimony (Tuesday) changes of the case," Uber said.

In its statement, Waymo called the latest allegations against Uber "significant and troubling

Alsup postponed the scheduled Dec. 4 start of the Waymo-Uber trial to give Waymo more gather evidence. He didn't immediately set a new trial date.
